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CBA EAST NEWS

CBA East's popular Online Lecture Series re-commences shortly. The first Lecture will be on **Tuesday January 30th at 7.30 pm.** David Flinham will talk about **King's Lynn under Siege.** After a short siege in the summer of 1643, Parliament recaptured the town of King's Lynn, Norfolk. Re-fortified to a design seldom seen anywhere else in the country, King's Lynn became the principal supply base for Parliament's armies operating in the east and northeast of England. 380 years later, King's Lynn is home to King's Lynn under Siege (KLuS), a ground-breaking archaeological project, which is uncovering traces of the town's fortifications. This talk will include the project's excavations in 2021 (featured in Channel 4's *Great British Dig* series) and 2022, and its further investigations in 2023. The project is providing a rare insight into the design and construction of earthwork fortifications during the English Civil War. David is the Project Director. His latest book, *The Town Well Fortified*, was published by Helion in 2023. 27th February at 7.30. Our second lecture is **Clare Castle: three seasons of archaeological community excavations** by **Jo Caruth**, Post Excavation Manager for Cotswold Archaeology Suffolk.

As a result of a National Lottery Heritage Fund award, the trustees of Clare Castle Country Park, Suffolk, were able to carry out three seasons of excavations within the grounds of the park between 2018 and 2021. The excavations were carried out by a volunteer team drawn from the local community, and supervised by Cotswold Archaeology. The Park incorporates the visible remains of a Norman motte and bailey castle and an abandoned Victorian railway station. CBA East Members had a tour of the excavation in 2021. Jo will present the story of the excavations and talk about what the community dig hoped to achieve, what pre-castle remains were found, and will bring us up to date on the post-excavation analysis. 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23rd February at 7.30. A cemetery, a settlement and a massacre: new genetic evidence from the first farmers in Central Europe by **Penny Bickle** (University of York).

This talk will present new DNA data from the first farmers in Central Europe, during the Neolithic period. While earlier DNA analysis has allowed us to examine how people were related to each other at a population level, we can now determine relatives at an individual level, allowing us to recreate families. Our study compared those buried at a settlement, a cemetery and a massacre to examine the different relationships present. This means we could test assumptions from previous work that women moved on marriage and that the Neolithic was largely patrilineal, with inheritance through male lineages. Our results also produced a couple of surprises which encouraged us to rethink earlier interpretations of what took place at the massacre burial site.

Penny Bickle is a senior lecturer at the University of York, where she directs the master's in funerary archaeology. She specialises in the archaeology of Central Europe.

Dr. Murphy worked for English Heritage for much of his career, first as an Archaeological Scientist and later as Coastal Change Officer, then Climate Change Officer. His principal project in Essex was the Hullbridge Survey, a complete survey of the Essex coast, recording sites from the Mesolithic to Post-Medieval period and focusing on one exceptionally well-preserved Neolithic settlement site, known as The Stumble, near Osea Island.
